## **Why Students Leave Boise State University**

**Research Report 97-03**

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### **ABSTRACT**

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Why do students leave Boise State University? In order to answer that question, students who were enrolled in the Fall but not in the spring (and who did not graduate or were dismissed) were surveyed using an instrument developed by ACT.

At least 20% of the respondents indicated that the following were either major or minor reasons for not returning. The responses are ordered by means and the percent agreeing is listed in parentheses.

- Conflict between demands of job and college (47%)
- Tuition and fees were more than I could afford (35%)
- Wanted a break from my college studies (40%)
- Experienced class scheduling problems (37%)
- Encountered unexpected expenses (32%)
- Accepted a full-time job (28%)
- Family responsibilities were too great (31%)
- Disappointed with the quality of instruction at this college (26%)
- Dissatisfied with my grades (25%)
- Academic advising was inadequate (24%)
- Inadequate study habits (23%)

Results from other colleges who had used the ACT survey were also available for comparison. The three biggest differences between Boise State University students and others were in the areas of job conflicts, scheduling, and transfer. Boise State University leavers were:

- more likely to indicate that they left because of conflicts between the demands of job and college (47% vs. 31%)
- more likely to experience class scheduling problems (37% vs. 18%)
- less likely to leave because they decided to attend a different college (16% vs. 30%).

About 40% of the respondents planned to return to Boise State University this year, while almost

60% planned to re-enroll again at some point in time. Compared to all fall-term enrollees, respondents were more likely to be older and had not yet reached their senior year. There were no differences by gender or by full-time enrollment status.

## Why Students Leave Boise State University

Why do students leave Boise State University? That was the question facing the Retention Committee. In order to answer it, 1,183 degree-seeking students enrolled in Fall 1995 but not in the spring (and who did not graduate or were dismissed) were randomly selected and surveyed using an instrument developed by ACT. Useable surveys were received from 443 or 37% of the group. The purpose of this report is to share the results of that survey. A copy of the survey can be found in Appendix A.

Students who responded to the survey were mainly young (63% under 30), female, enrolled full-time, and either in their freshman or sophomore year. As shown by the table below, this is generally reflective of the University's degree-seekers, except that the general student body is younger (69% under 30) and has more seniors and graduate students. This may indicate that older students who are in the early stages of their college career are more likely to leave.

Certainly the survey results indicate that students have more than just academics on their minds. When asked to rate each of 48 items as a major reason for leaving (coded as a 3), a minor reason (coded as a 2), or not a reason (coded 1), students indicated they mainly left because of conflicts between the demands of job and college. Almost half (47%) of students indicated that this was a major or minor reason for leaving. A second reason was that students left because tuition and fees were more than they could afford. This outranked the reasons in third and fourth place—wanting a break from college studies and experiencing class scheduling problems—because of the number of students indicating this was a major reason for leaving. Are these results similar to those received by other institutions who have given the survey to non-returning students? Findings suggest that Boise State University has some different issues

compared to these other institutions. For the top four reasons listed by Boise State University students, only 18-31% of other students selected these as reasons for leaving compared to 35-47% of BSU students. While conflicts between the demands of job and college was ranked second by students nationally, the number one reason for leaving was that students decided to attend a different college. At Boise State, this reason had a mean rank of 12<sup>th</sup>, probably because our students are place-bound and lack the choices that students in more populated areas have. Other reasons included in the top four nationally were leaving because of health related problems and/or because family responsibilities became too great, reasons which had ranks of 11<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> respectively at BSU.

In fact, if a difference between means of more than 0.1 is taken as significant, there are differences between Boise State University and the national group on 10 items. These items have been placed in bold and italicized on Table 2. In addition to the reasons already mentioned, Boise State University respondents were more likely to indicate the following were reasons for leaving: *disappointment with the quality of instruction, impersonal attitudes of college faculty or staff, and dissatisfaction with the University's academic reputation.* They were less likely to mention moving as a reason for leaving. It should be recognized, however, that the national data is not necessarily reflective of the "average" institution nationally. Rather, it is simply a grouping of data from institutions ranging from public to private and from community college to research university. Perusal of the institutions included in the data set also indicate that many are located in the mid-West rather than the western portions of the country.

So what's next for Boise State University leavers? About 40% of the students indicated that within the next year they planned to either enroll again in college or obtain a job and enroll in college. Most of the remainder either planned just to work (37%) or care for their home and family (8%). Almost 60% planned to return to Boise State University at some point in time; only 15% were sure they would return. See Table 3 for further details.

These findings show that students leave Boise State for many reasons, and some of them are beyond the control of the University. In addition, most former students believe they are likely to return to the University at some future point in time. Despite this, however, there are areas where the University could take some steps that might lead to improved retention. These include attention to issues such as class scheduling, quality of instruction, academic advising, and a campus climate described by some as too impersonal. Efforts are already underway in some areas (e.g., academic advising), but further attention could only benefit Boise State University and the students it serves.
