

# Associated Students of Boise State University

Spring 2025 Executive Election Results

The total number of voters in the Spring 2025 ASBSU Student Government Elections was 2,242, which was 11.7% of the eligible voters. The results of the election are as follows:

- President and Vice President: **Isaac Celedon and Kate Perkes** win with 1,318 votes, 64.6% of the votes cast for that position. Austin Rose and Abby Berndt received 685 votes, 33.6% of the votes cast for that position.
- Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs: **Ethan Mariner** wins with 1,307 votes, 65.1% of the votes cast for that position. Carson Cole received 669 votes, 33.3% of the votes cast for that position.
- Associate Vice President of Ethics Affairs: **Layne Johnson** wins with 1,336 votes, 67% of the votes cast for that position. Caden Skelton received 626 votes, 31.4% of the votes cast for that position.
- Associate Vice President of Financial Affairs: **Natalie Rivera** wins with 1,302 votes, 64.9% of the votes cast for that position. Ivan Perkins received 673 votes, 33.5% of the votes cast for that position.
- Associate Vice President of Inclusive Excellence: **Alice Mwamba** wins with 1,091 votes, 55.5% of the votes cast for that position. Madison Kincaid received 832 votes, 42.3% of the votes cast for that position.
- Associate Vice President of Student Relations: **Diego Tapia** wins with 1,189 votes, 60% of the votes cast for that position. Vandal Birkenfeld received 761 votes, 38.4% of the votes cast for that position.
- Associate Vice President of Greek Affairs: **Emia Venegas** wins with 473 votes, 68.2% of the votes cast for that position. Josiah DeChambeau received 213 votes, 30.7% of the votes cast for that position.

• Review Board Chief: **Gavin Verandes** wins with 1,161 votes, 59.6% of the votes cast for that position. Dominic Mancini received 752 votes, 38.6% of the votes cast for that position.

### Senator positions

- At-Large: After calculating votes based on the ranked choice voting system, **Dimitri Sydoruk** (1298 votes, 66.2%) and **Mason Magee** (664 votes, 33.8%) win the two senator positions representing Senator At-Large. See breakdown of ranked choice voting distribution in Appendix A.
- College of Arts and Sciences: **Marissa Nunez** (371 votes, 54.4%) and **Billy Kidd** (170 votes, 25%) win the two senator positions representing the College of Arts and Sciences.
- College of Business and Economics: Luca Collins (349 votes, 53.4%) and Luke Momberg (214 votes, 32.8%) win the two senator positions representing the College of Business and Economics.
- College of Education: After calculating votes based on the ranked choice voting system, Alyssa Almaraz (49 votes, 53.85%) and Alana Heusser (42 votes, 46.15%) win the two senator positions representing the College of Education. See breakdown of ranked choice voting distribution in Appendix B.
- College of Engineering: After calculating votes based on the ranked choice voting system and a candidate withdrawal from the race, Wyatt Flick (114 votes, 57%) and Stella Baron (86 votes, 43%) win the two senator positions representing the College of Engineering. See breakdown of ranked choice voting distribution in Appendix C.
- College of Health Sciences: After calculating votes based on the ranked choice voting system, **Max Whitted** (273 votes, 58.2%) and **Allie Neet** (196 votes, 41.8%) win the two senator positions representing the College of Health Sciences. See breakdown of ranked choice voting distribution in Appendix D.
- College of Innovation and Design: There were no candidates listed on the ballot for this position, and no qualified write-in candidates reached the needed threshold to win the position. The position will be filled through a candidate nomination at a later date.
- School of Public Service: After calculating votes based on the ranked choice voting system, **Delana Legault** (131 votes, 53%) and **K'Lee Burbank** (116 votes, 47%) win the two senator positions representing the School of Public Service. See breakdown of ranked choice voting distribution in Appendix E.

- Honors College: After calculating votes based on the ranked choice voting system, **Aubrey Mindlin** (191 votes, 57.9%) and **Cameron Hooker** (139 votes, 42.1%) win the two senator positions representing the Honors College. See breakdown of ranked choice voting distribution in Appendix F.
- Graduate College: There were no candidates listed on the ballot for this position, and no qualified write-in candidates reached the needed threshold to win the position. The position will be filled through a candidate nomination at a later date.

ASBSU officers will have a transition period in April, and the Inauguration of new officers will take place on Wednesday, April 30.

#### Appendix A: Breakdown of ranked choice voting for Senator At-Large

There was no majority winner (50%+1) among the four possible selections (three candidates and write-in votes), therefore the ranked choice voting system was utilized. 1,962 ballots were cast for this position.

Round 1 Dimitri Sydoruk = 946 first preference votes Mason Magee = 590 first preference votes Aidan Neufeld = 390 first preference votes Write-in candidates = 36 first preference votes

The Write-In ticket is eliminated and the second preferences of Write-In ticket voters are distributed amongst the rest of the candidates. The results for the second round are:

Dimitri Sydoruk = 946 first preference votes + 14 write-in ticket second preference votes= 960 total votes (48.93%) Mason Magee = 590 first preference votes + 14 write-in ticket second preference votes= 604 total votes (30.78%) Aidan Neufeld = 390 first preference votes + 8 write-in ticket second preference votes= 398 total votes (20.29%)

Since there is still no majority winner, Aidan Neufeld is eliminated and the second preferences of Aidan Neufeld are distributed among the two remaining candidates. In order to ensure that all votes are counted we must take into consideration the people that ranked Aidan Neufeld as their first preference and then ranked the Write-In ticket as their second preference, since Write-In Ticket and Aidan Neufeld were eliminated.

Another issue is what to do with the additional ballots where voters ranked the Write-In ticket as their first preference and Aidan Neufeld as their second preference, since they are both eliminated. In this case, in order to account for those votes in the third-round allocation, we must take all the third preference votes of those ballots and redistribute them to the remaining two tickets accordingly.

With all of this in mind, the results for the third round are:

Dimitri Sydoruk = 946 first preference votes + 14 write-in ticket second preference votes + 327 second preference votes from those ranking Aidan Neufeld as first + 7 votes from third preference ranking (Aidan first, Write-in second) + 4 votes from third preference ranking (Write-in first, Aidan second) = **1,298 total votes** (66.16%)

Mason Magee = 590 first preference votes + 14 write-in ticket second preference votes + 52 second preference votes from those ranking Aidan Neufeld as first + 4 votes from third preference ranking (Aidan first, Write-in second) + 4 votes from third preference ranking (Write-in first, Aidan second) = **664 total votes** (33.84%)

The end result is that **Dimitri Sydoruk** (1,298 votes, 66.16%) and **Mason Magee** (664 votes, 33.84%) win the two Senator At-Large seats.

#### Appendix B: Breakdown of ranked choice voting for Senator - College of Education

There was no majority winner (50%+1) among the five possible selections (four candidates and write-in votes), therefore the ranked choice voting system was utilized. 91 ballots were cast for this position from eligible voters enrolled in the college.

Round 1 Alyssa Almaraz = 41 first preference votes Alana Heusser = 22 first preference votes Chloe Conklin = 15 first preference votes Taylor St. Martin = 13 first preference votes Write-in = 0 first preference votes

The Write-In ticket is eliminated, but since there were zero write-in candidates with first preference votes, there are no second preference votes to distribute. Therefore, Taylor St. Martin is eliminated and the second preference votes are distributed to the other candidates. The results for the second round are:

Alyssa Almaraz = 41 first preference votes + 3 second preference votes from Taylor St. Martin first preference = 44 total votes (48.35%) Alana Heusser = 22 first preference votes + 3 second preference votes from Taylor St. Martin first preference= 25 total votes (27.47%) Chloe Conklin = 15 first preference votes + 7 second preference votes from Taylor St. Martin first preference= 22 total votes (24.18%)

Since there is still no majority winner, Chloe Conklin is eliminated and the second preferences of Chloe Conklin are distributed among the two remaining candidates. In order to ensure that all votes are counted we must take into consideration the people that ranked Chloe Conklin as their first preference and then ranked Taylor St. Martin as their second preference, since Taylor St. Martin and Chloe Conklin were eliminated.

Another issue is what to do with the additional ballots where voters ranked Taylor St. Martin as their first preference and Chloe Conklin as their second preference, since they are both eliminated. In this case, in order to account for those votes in the third-round allocation, we must take all the third preference votes of those ballots and redistribute them to the remaining two tickets accordingly. We must also consider the ballots that ranked first preference to Taylor St. Martin, second preference to Chloe Conklin, and third preference to Write-in candidates since all of these candidates have been eliminated.

With all of this in mind, the results for the third round are:

Alyssa Almaraz = 41 first preference votes + 3 second preference votes from Taylor St. Martin first preference + 3 third preference votes (Chloe Conklin first, Taylor St. Martin second) + 2 third preference votes (Taylor St. Martin first, Chloe Conklin second) + 0 fourth preference votes (Taylor St. Martin first, Chloe Conklin second, Write-in third) = **49 total votes** (53.85%)

Alana Heusser = 22 first preference votes + 3 second preference votes from Taylor St. Martin first preference + 12 third preference votes (Chloe Conklin first, Taylor St. Martin second) + 2 third preference votes (Taylor St. Martin first, Chloe Conklin second) + 3 fourth preference votes (Taylor St. Martin first, Chloe Conklin second, Write-in third)= **42 total votes** (46.15%)

The end result is that **Alyssa Almaraz** (49 votes, 53.85%) and **Alana Heusser** (42 votes, 46.15%) win the two College of Education senator positions.

#### Appendix C: Breakdown of ranked choice voting for Senator - College of Engineering

There was no majority winner (50%+1) among the five possible selections (four candidates and write-in votes), therefore the ranked choice voting system was utilized. 200 ballots were cast for this position from eligible voters enrolled in the college.

Round 1 Wyatt Flick = 70 first preference votes Rachel Lester = 48 first preference votes Stella Baron = 40 first preference votes James Stringham = 36 first preference votes Write-in candidates = 6 first preference votes

The Write-In ticket is eliminated and the second preferences of Write-In ticket voters are distributed amongst the rest of the candidates. The results for the second round are:

Wyatt Flick = 70 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes= 70 total votes (35%) Rachel Lester = 48 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes= 48 total votes (24%) Stella Baron = 40 first preference votes + 6 write-in ticket second preference votes= 46 total votes (23%) James Stringham = 36 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes= 36 total votes (18%)

Since there is still no majority winner, James Stringham is eliminated and the second preferences of James Stringham are distributed among the three remaining candidates. In

order to ensure that all votes are counted we must take into consideration the people that ranked James Stringham as their first preference and then ranked the Write-In ticket as their second preference, since the Write-In Ticket and James Stringham were eliminated.

Another issue is what to do with the additional ballots where voters ranked the Write-In ticket as their first preference and James Stringham as their second preference, since they are both eliminated. In this case, in order to account for those votes in the third-round allocation, we must take all the third preference votes of those ballots and redistribute them to the remaining two tickets accordingly.

With all of this in mind, the results for the third round are:

Wyatt Flick = 70 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes + 26 second preference votes from those that ranked James Stringham first + 0 third preference votes (James Stringham first, Write-in second) + 0 third preference votes (write-in first, James Stringham first) = 96 total votes (48%)

Rachel Lester = 48 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes + 3 second preference votes from those that ranked James Stringham first + 1 third preference votes (James Stringham first, Write-in second) + 0 third preference votes (write-in first, James Stringham first)= 52 total votes (26%)

Stella Baron = 40 first preference votes + 6 write-in ticket second preference votes + 6 second preference votes from those that ranked James Stringham first + 0 third preference votes (James Stringham first, Write-in second) + 0 third preference votes (write-in first, James Stringham first)= 52 total votes (26%)

There is no majority winner after round three and a tie for second place. Since there is a tie between the bottom two remaining candidates, the ASBSU tie-breaking protocol will need to be followed. Also, since a first place candidate must win by 50% + 1 majority, there is no clear winner.

The two candidates in the tie for second place initially agreed to a coin flip following one of the ASBSU tie-breaking protocols. Upon further discussion, Rachel Lester decided to drop out of the race.

Since Rachel dropped out of the race, the votes provided to her could be redistributed to the remaining candidates following the ranked choice voting system. There are a lot of factors to consider in this round since three options have been removed and all combinations of votes for first, second, and third preference rankings must be taken into consideration to account for all ballots.

Here is a breakdown of round four distributions:

Wyatt Flick = 70 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes + 26 second preference votes from those that ranked James Stringham first + 0 third preference votes (James Stringham first, Write-in second) + 0 third preference votes (write-in first, James Stringham first) + 12 second preference votes from those who ranked Rachel Lester

first + 6 third preference votes (Rachel Lester first, James Stringham second) + 0 third preference votes (James Stringham first, Rachel Lester second) + 0 fourth preference votes (James Stringham first, Write-in second, Rachel Lester third) = **114 total votes** (57%)

Stella Baron = 40 first preference votes + 6 write-in ticket second preference votes + 6 second preference votes from those that ranked James Stringham first + 0 third preference votes (James Stringham first, Write-in second) + 0 third preference votes (write-in first, James Stringham first) + 30 second preference votes from those who ranked Rachel Lester first + 0 third preference votes (Rachel Lester first, James Stringham second) + 3 third preference votes (James Stringham first, Write-in second, Rachel Lester second) + 1 fourth preference vote (James Stringham first, Write-in second, Rachel Lester third) = **86 total votes** (43%)

The end result is that **Wyatt Flick** (114 votes, 57%) and **Stella Baron** (86 votes, 43%) win the two College of Engineering senator positions.

# Appendix D: Breakdown of ranked choice voting for Senator - College of Health Sciences

There was no majority winner (50%+1) among the five possible selections (four candidates and write-in votes), therefore the ranked choice voting system was utilized. 469 ballots were cast for this position from eligible voters enrolled in the college.

Round 1 Max Whitted = 169 first preference votes Allie Neet = 140 first preference votes Brady Cooper = 100 first preference votes Kaitlyn Matthys = 50 first preference votes Write-in candidates = 10 first preference votes

The Write-In ticket is eliminated and the second preferences of Write-In ticket voters are distributed amongst the rest of the candidates. The results for the second round are:

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Max Whitted = 169 first preference votes + 3 write-in ticket second preference votes= 172 total votes (36.67%)
Allie Neet = 140 first preference votes + 2 write-in ticket second preference votes= 142 total votes (30.28%)
Brady Cooper = 100 first preference votes + 2 write-in ticket second preference votes= 102 total votes (21.75%)
Kaitlyn Matthys = 50 first preference votes + 3 write-in ticket second preference votes= 53 total votes (11.3%)
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Since there is still no majority winner, Kaitlyn Matthys is eliminated and the second preferences of Kaitlyn Matthys are distributed among the three remaining candidates. In order to ensure that all votes are counted we must take into consideration the people that

ranked Kaitlyn Matthys as their first preference and then ranked the Write-In ticket as their second preference, since the Write-In Ticket and Kaitlyn Matthys were eliminated.

Another issue is what to do with the additional ballots where voters ranked the Write-In ticket as their first preference and Kaitlyn Matthys as their second preference, since they are both eliminated. In this case, in order to account for those votes in the third-round allocation, we must take all the third preference votes of those ballots and redistribute them to the remaining two tickets accordingly.

With all of this in mind, the results for the third round are:

Max Whitted = 70 first preference votes + 3 write-in ticket second preference votes + 4 second preference votes from those ranking Kaitlyn Matthys as first preference + 0 third preference ranking (Kaitlyn Matthys first, Write-in second) + 2 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Kaitlyn Matthys as second) = 178 total votes (37.95%) Allie Neet = 140 first preference votes + 2 write-in ticket second preference votes + 40 second preference votes from those ranking Kaitlyn Matthys as first preference + 0 third preference ranking (Kaitlyn Matthys first, Write-in second) + 1 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Kaitlyn Matthys as second)= 183 total votes (39.02%) Brady Cooper = 100 first preference votes + 2 write-in ticket second preference votes + 6 second preference votes from those ranking Kaitlyn Matthys as first preference + 0 third preference ranking (Kaitlyn Matthys first, Write-in second) + 1 third preference votes + 6 second preference votes from those ranking Kaitlyn Matthys as first preference + 0 third preference ranking (Kaitlyn Matthys first, Write-in second) + 0 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Kaitlyn Matthys as second)= 108 total votes (23.03%)

There is no majority winner after round three, therefore Brady Cooper is eliminated and we move into round four of distributing votes. There are a lot of factors to consider in this round since three options have been removed and all combinations of votes for first, second, and third preference rankings must be taken into consideration to account for all ballots.

Here is a breakdown of round four distributions:

Max Whitted = 70 first preference votes + 3 write-in ticket second preference votes + 4 second preference votes from those ranking Kaitlyn Matthys as first preference + 0 third preference ranking (Kaitlyn Matthys first, Write-in second) + 2 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Kaitlyn Matthys as second) + 74 second preference votes from those ranking Brady Cooper as first preference + 1 third preference ranking (Brady Cooper first, Write-in second) + 2 fourth preference ranking (Brady Cooper first, Write-in second) + 1 fourth preference ranking (Write-in first, Kaitlyn Matthys third) + 1 fourth preference ranking (Brady Cooper first, Kaitlyn Matthys second, Brady Cooper third) + 12 third preference ranking (Brady Cooper first, Kaitlyn Matthys second) + 5 third preference ranking (Kaitlyn Matthys first, Brady Cooper second) = **273 total votes** (58.21%)

Allie Neet = 140 first preference votes + 2 write-in ticket second preference votes + 40 second preference votes from those ranking Kaitlyn Matthys as first preference + 0 third preference ranking (Kaitlyn Matthys first, Write-in second) + 1 third preference ranking

(Write-in first, Kaitlyn Matthys as second) + 5 second preference votes from those ranking Brady Cooper as first preference + 0 third preference ranking (Brady Cooper first, Write-in second) + 1 fourth preference ranking (Brady Cooper first, Write-in second, Kaitlyn Matthys third) + 0 fourth preference ranking (Write-in first, Kailtyn Matthys second, Brady Cooper third) + 6 third preference ranking (Brady Cooper first, Kaitlyn Matthys second) + 1 third preference ranking (Kaitlyn Matthys first, Brady Cooper second) = **196 total votes** (41.79%)

The end result is that **Max Whitted** (273 votes, 58.21%) and **Allie Neet** (196 votes, 41.79%) win the two College of Health Sciences senator positions.

## Appendix E: Breakdown of ranked choice voting for Senator - School of Public Service

There was no majority winner (50%+1) among the five possible selections (four candidates and write-in votes), therefore the ranked choice voting system was utilized. 247 ballots were cast for this position from eligible voters enrolled in the college.

Round 1 Delana Legault = 89 first preference votes K'Lee Burbank = 98 first preference votes Maggie Tell = 34 first preference votes Stephen DeAmbrogio = 19 first preference votes Write-in candidates = 7 first preference votes

The Write-In ticket is eliminated and the second preferences of Write-In ticket voters are distributed amongst the rest of the candidates. The results for the second round are:

Delana Legault = 89 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes= 89 total votes (36.03%) K'Lee Burbank = 98 first preference votes + 5 write-in ticket second preference votes= 103 total votes (41.7%) Maggie Tell = 34 first preference votes + 1 write-in ticket second preference votes= 35 total votes (14.17%) Stephen DeAmbrogio = 19 first preference votes + 1 write-in ticket second preference votes= 20 total votes (8.1%)

Since there is still no majority winner, Stephen DeAmbrogio is eliminated and the second preferences of Stephen DeAmbrogio are distributed among the three remaining candidates. In order to ensure that all votes are counted we must take into consideration the people that ranked Stephen DeAmbrogio as their first preference and then ranked the Write-In ticket as their second preference, since the Write-In Ticket and Stephen DeAmbrogio were eliminated.

Another issue is what to do with the additional ballots where voters ranked the Write-In ticket as their first preference and Stephen DeAmbrogio as their second preference, since they are both eliminated. In this case, in order to account for those votes in the third-round allocation, we must take all the third preference votes of those ballots and redistribute them to the remaining two tickets accordingly.

With all of this in mind, the results for the third round are:

Delana Legault = 89 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes + 5 second preference ranking from those who ranked Stephen DeAmbrogio first + 0 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second) = 94 total votes (38.06%) K'Lee Burbank = 98 first preference votes + 5 write-in ticket second preference votes + 1 second preference ranking from those who ranked Stephen DeAmbrogio first + 0 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second)= 104 total votes (42.11%) Maggie Tell = 34 first preference votes + 1 write-in ticket second preference votes + 13 second preference ranking from those who ranked Stephen DeAmbrogio first + 1 third preference ranking from those who ranked Stephen DeAmbrogio first + 1 third preference ranking from those who ranked Stephen DeAmbrogio first + 1 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second)= 49 total votes (19.84%)

There is no majority winner after round three, therefore Maggie Tell is eliminated and we move into round four of distributing votes. There are a lot of factors to consider in this round since three options have been removed and all combinations of votes for first, second, and third preference rankings must be taken into consideration to account for all ballots.

Here is a breakdown of round four distributions:

Delana Legault = 89 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes + 5 second preference ranking from those who ranked Stephen DeAmbrogio first + 0 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second) + 6 second preference votes from those who ranked Maggie Tell first + 3 fourth preference ranking (Maggie Tell first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second, Write-in third) + 1 fourth place ranking (Write-in first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second, Maggie Tell third) + 1 fourth place ranking (Write-in first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second, Maggie Tell third) + 17 third preference ranking (Maggie Tell first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second) + 9 third preference ranking (Stephen DeAmbrogio first, Maggie Tell second) + 0 fourth preference ranking (Stephen DeAmbrogio first, Maggie Tell second, Write-in third) = **131 total votes** (53.04%)

K'Lee Burbank = 98 first preference votes + 5 write-in ticket second preference votes + 1 second preference ranking from those who ranked Stephen DeAmbrogio first + 0 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second) + 3 second preference votes from those who ranked Maggie Tell first + 3 fourth preference ranking (Maggie Tell first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second, Write-in third) + 0 fourth place ranking (Write-in first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second, Maggie Tell third) + 0 fourth place ranking (Write-in first, Maggie Tell second, Stephen DeAmbrogio third) + 2 third preference ranking (Maggie Tell first, Stephen DeAmbrogio second) + 0 third preference ranking (Stephen DeAmbrogio first,

#### Appendix F: Breakdown of ranked choice voting for Senator - Honors College

There was no majority winner (50%+1) among the four possible selections (three candidates and write-in votes), therefore the ranked choice voting system was utilized. 330 ballots were cast for this position from eligible voters enrolled in the college.

Round 1 Aubrey Mindlin = 119 first preference votes Cameron Hooker = 117 first preference votes Emilia Nowinski = 90 first preference votes Write-in candidates = 4 first preference votes

The Write-In ticket is eliminated and the second preferences of Write-In ticket voters are distributed amongst the rest of the candidates. The results for the second round are:

Aubrey Mindlin = 119 first preference votes + 1 write-in ticket second preference votes = 120 total votes (36.36%) Cameron Hooker = 117 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes = 117 total votes (35.45%) Emilia Nowinski = 90 first preference votes + 3 write-in ticket second preference votes = 93 total votes (28.18%)

Since there is still no majority winner, Emilia Nowinski is eliminated and the second preferences of Emilia Nowinski are distributed among the two remaining candidates. In order to ensure that all votes are counted we must take into consideration the people that ranked Emilia Nowinski as their first preference and then ranked the Write-In ticket as their second preference, since Write-In Ticket and Emilia Nowinski were eliminated.

Another issue is what to do with the additional ballots where voters ranked the Write-In ticket as their first preference and Emilia Nowinski as their second preference, since they are both eliminated. In this case, in order to account for those votes in the third-round allocation, we must take all the third preference votes of those ballots and redistribute them to the remaining two tickets accordingly.

With all of this in mind, the results for the third round are:

Aubrey Mindlin = 119 first preference votes + 1 write-in ticket second preference votes + 59 second preference votes from those who ranked Emilia Nowinski first + 10 third preference ranking (Emilia Nowinski first, Write-in second) + 2 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Emilia Nowinski second) = **191 total votes** (57.88%)

Cameron Hooker = 117 first preference votes + 0 write-in ticket second preference votes + 18 second preference votes from those who ranked Emilia Nowinski first + 3 third preference ranking (Emilia Nowinski first, Write-in second) + 1 third preference ranking (Write-in first, Emilia Nowinski second)= **139 total votes** (42.12%)

The end result is that **Aubrey Mindlin** (191 votes, 57.88%) and **Cameron Hooker** (139 votes, 42.12%) win the two Honors College senator seats.
