

Box 1: The Intersections of the Major, the Liberal Arts, and Life



And did you know?

- ✓ Employers don't see a distinction between liberal arts education and employment preparation.
- ✓ Therefore, gaining the skills of liberal education is employment preparation . . . as long as students know how to apply those skills.



Sociology and meaningful work...

By integrating knowing with doing, sociology majors develop socially responsible, practical and intellectual problem-solving skills employers seek:

- Leadership
- Communication
- Analytical reasoning
- Teamwork
 - E.g. Sociology Students in San Jose raised the local minimum wage \$2 an hour!

- Students are equipped to pursue meaningful work within a wide range of careers
 - E.g. Careers in social justice occupations
- Students are prepared to participate in public affairs
