

#### **Travel Corner**

#### Steens Mountain, by Carol Fountain

Sixty miles south of Burns, Oregon is an area of geologic interest. Steens mountain is not a triangular mountain, as we usually think of a mountain, but instead is a ridge of volcanic rock. Although it is sometimes thought of as a mountain range, it is in fact one mountain, and stretches about 50 miles north to south. The mountain has along the east side the Alvord desert, which is a popular spot for high speed record attempts. The mountain was named in 1860 for a US soldier who fought and chased Paiutes from the area. The mountain rises to an elevation of 9377 feet. The Steens Mountain wilderness was established in 2000 and covers more than 120,000 acres. It is one of the wildest and most remote wilderness areas in the state of Oregon. There are many opportunities for recreation including camping, fishing, hiking, bathing in hot springs, stargazing, soaring, photography, hunting, sightseeing to nearby historical sites, and winter activities like snowmobiling and skiing. Fishing for trout is a favorite pastime in the Donner and Blitzen rivers (not named for Santa's reindeer but from German phrases for thunder and lightning).

There is a 52-mile Steens Mountain Byway loop road which provides access to campgrounds, lakes, and viewpoints such as Kiger Gorge. The Byway begins near the Page Springs campground and the famous Frenchglen hotel. Along the route is the Kiger Wild Horse viewing lookout as well as various other viewing areas.

The area is also close to the historic P ranch and the Malheur Wildlife Refuge. Another travel note in future will provide further information about the historic P ranch.

#### British Isles Cruise, by Janet Davis

During early August 2019, my husband and I took a Viking ocean cruise that stopped in all of the countries of the British Isles. Before embarking on the cruise, we spent three days in Edinburgh, Scotland. While in Edinburgh tours took us to the Royal Yacht Britannia, to St. Andrews, to Edinburgh Castle, and to Glamis Castle. Since my husband is a bag piper, his greatest thrill was attending the opening night of the Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo with massed bag pipe bands from all over the world. The ninety-minute performance also included choirs, violinists, dancers and this year, a steel drum band from Trinidad and Tobago. Edinburgh is packed with tourists in August with the Military Tattoo, the Fringe Festival, the International Book Festival, The International Festival (a classical music festival), and the Art Festival. We also saw the restaurant where legend has it that J.K. Rowling conceived the idea for the Harry Potter books.

From Edinburgh, we flew to London and then were bused to Greenwich where we embarked on the ship. Prior to leaving on the cruise we enjoyed a boat ride from Greenwich up the Thames and a ride in the London Eye (a giant 32 capsule Ferris wheel). (My oldest daughter and I visited Greenwich several years ago and spent all of our time at the fascinating museum at the Royal Observatory — much more interesting than looking at the outside of the royal palaces that are in Greenwich).

From Greenwich we sailed to Dover with a stop to travel to Canterbury. We did not go into the cathedral, but found a lovely park along The Great Stour River. After a day at sea our next stops (one day in each location) were in Dublin, Ireland; Holyhead, Wales; then back to England with a stop in Liverpool. It was raining in Liverpool and we missed the Beatles statue, but it seemed that most of our tour was about the Beatles. From there we went to Belfast, Northern Ireland where we saw the political wall murals and heard several stories of the conflict between Ireland and Northern Ireland.

Our next several stops were in various places in Scotland: Ullapool in the Highlands where we were taken to a pub to enjoy the local ale and listen to a very talented accordion player; Kirkwall in the Orkneys; back to Edinburgh; Invergordon in the Highlands; Lerwick in the Shetland Islands where the included tour took us to a Shetland Pony farm to learn about the ponies. We also learned that in the Shetland Islands sheep out number people five to one and that the Islands receive over 240 days of moisture a year. In addition to the included tour we paid for a tour that took us to the archaeological site of Jarlshof, one of the most complex archaeological sites ever excavated in Britain. The 5,000 year old site includes Neolithic, Bronze age, Iron Age, Viking, and early British features.

The Orkney Islands was one of our favorite places. There we visited the Ring of Brodgar. With its 27 remaining standing stones, this 5,000 year old UNESCO World Heritage site is the finest known circular stone ring from the early Bronze age.

From Invergordon, we were bused to Inverness where we visited the Cathedral and walked along the Ness River. We did not get to Loch Ness to look for Nessy.

Our cruise ended in Bergen, Norway where we spent two days before flying home. We of course, took a fjord cruise which was spectacular. There had been recent rains so the streams and waterfalls off the edges of the fjord were beautiful.

We often talk about how small the world is. It was on the path to the Ring of Brodgar that we met friends who were on another cruise ship that was in port that day. On our ship we met a man who had worked with my husband for several years. I also talked to another person on the ship who lives in Kuna.

We have been on several cruises and this was one of the most enjoyable.
