The idea for the "ICB Urdu-Inkspots Issue" struck me as I read an e-mail posted by Judith Hoffberg about an Indian newspaper, The Musalman, reportedly today the world's only handwritten newspaper. A team of six puts out this hand-penned paper. Four of them are katibs -- writers dedicated to the ancient art of Urdu calligraphy. It takes three hours using pen, ink and ruler to transform a sheet of paper into news and art. The article noted "the paper is widely read and appreciated by Muslims in Tripplicane and Chennai where the paper has a circulation of 20,000."

We could do that, I thought and for one day double the number of handwritten "newspapers" being published, although

our circulation would only be to of our Indian inspiration's. And why should we? Calligraphy is one of the important arts a book artist may draw upon when creating a bookwork, and bookworks are our business. 




